




## A Dozen Stacks

A stacked pyramid shape is a natural tendency when making images in a grid-based medium. Since one ongoing goal is to defy an immediate recognition of the grid, I have to make a dynamic enough image to overcome that initial reading. For this piece I looked through and printed a number of pyramid-based images from the past few years and selected a final set of twelve. As a basic triangular form, a pyramid can also be seen as a mountain, a form that I have frequently used in paintings the past few years.




## Best of...




## **Everybody Knows This is Nowhere**




## Il Veneto




## The Odd Month




## Familiar Faces




## Frames & Crossbars

Paintings are often thought of as windows through which we look at something, and these drawings use the basic four pane window frame format. The challenge was how to sustain interest over thirty one days: the first ten images have four equal quadrants; in the next ten images the intersection of the crossbars shifts around the plane within the frame; and in the final eleven images the crossbars don't align or are disconnected.

## Ann McConville & Chris Ashley: Collaboration

Ann selected thirty photos from her archives over the past several years, all made during her travels, and provided titles. My job was to make a drawing in response to the photo. Sometimes I am trying to work with and extend her photo, and sometimes I'm trying to work against the photo. I may use a color or shape or sense of space from the photo, or I may try to do something oppositional. Typically I'm trying to extend or enhance the meaning in the photo. In the end, the photo and drawing should feel integrated and whole, like something new, rather than two pieces stuck together.
